eliberations of the African
Athletes' Forum organised
by ANOCA took place on 11
and 12 March 2023, with
representatives of all 54 African
NOCs in attendance. Organised
in collaboration with the IOC, the Algiers
Forum was an opportunity for representatives
of ANOCA member NOCs to discuss

major issues concerning the continent's athletes and elect their representatives in the ANOCA Athletes' Commission. The meeting highlighted the importance and role of athletes in Olympic institutions, by giving them the opportunity to create a communication network among NOCs, ANOCA and IOC Athletes' Commissions. It also afforded an opportunity for the





continent's athletes to talk unity with just one year to the Paris 2024 Games and three to Dakar 2026, two major challenging events for African athletes.

The Algiers event was attended by senior ANOCA officials, including President Mustapha Berraf, the Algerian Minister of Youth and Sports, Abderrazak Sebgag, the Chair of the IOC Athletes' Commission, Emma Terho, World and Olympic Champions as well as high profile African sports dignitaries.

Established in 2013, the ANOCA Athletes' Commission is actively and fully playing its role in boosting sports and Olympism in Africa.

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he African Athletes' Forum
opened on 11 March 2023, with
athletes from all 54 member
NOCs. Also present were ANOCA
President Mustapha Berraf, the
Algerian Minister of Youth and

Besides the opening ceremony which featured speeches by the President of NOC Algeria, the acting Chair of the ANOCA Athletes' Commission, the President of the supreme governing body of the African Olympic Movement and the Algerian Minister of Youth and Sports respectively, the deliberations also featured papers by several partner bodies and workshops. The highpoint of the meeting was the election of the Commission's executive

board, following which Gaby Ahrens of Namibia was elected Commission Chair.

Suffice it to note that the Algiers Forum fully supported the independence of the Olympic Movement based on the principles of Olympism, without discrimination of nationality, religion or ethnicity. In this regard, the Forum participants resolved that athletes should not be penalised for the

actions of their governments. In their opinion, athletes should be able to participate in international competitions without any form of discrimination. Concerning the participation of Russian and Belarusian athletes, they must return to international competitions on condition that they do so as strictly neutral athletes, as earlier moved by the 59th session of the ANOCA Executive Committee on 3 March 2023 in Nouakchott.

Elects New Board in Algiers

ne of the highlights of the Algiers Forum was undoubtedly the election of the Athletes' representatives within the ANOCA Athletes' Commission. At the end of this election, Namibian shooter Gaby Ahrens, flag bearer of her country at the 2012 London Olympic Games, was elected Chair of the Commission. This bodes well for the future, as Gaby who, as a candidate for the position of ANOCA AC Chair, presented her vision in her candidate manifesto:

"As chairperson of the ANOCA AC I would ensure that the AC works as a collective to truly represent the views and opinions of each region of our vast continent.

My leadership approach is a team approach, and I believe that each AC member has a key role within the AC which speaks to their interest and passion and in this way can contribute positively and constructively.





I am committed to give the input, energy and time the AC deserves.

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I understand and respect the importance of engaging and building strong relations with all athlete stakeholders and know that by all working together, we can really do a lot of good work within the Olympic Movement on the African continent.

One of my key focus areas would be to ensure athletes and the international Olympic movement build a positive association with the ANOCA AC by developing a communication strategy and campaign which supports, empowers and engages with african athletes.

I am committed to give the input, energy and time the AC deserves."

Volleyball player Victoire Ngon Ntame (Cameroon), who represented her country in Rio 2016, was elected Vice Chair of a commission that also includes Aya Medany, (Egypt), silver medallist at the 2008 World Modern Pentathlon Championships. Ahrens and Ngon Ntame will both sit on the ANOCA Executive Committee.

Paul Tergat, President of NOC Kenya and IOC member, also used the occasion to thank ANOCA President Mustapha Berraf

for appointing him as interim Chairman of the Athletes' Commission and to organise the first ever election of the ANOCA Athletes' Commission. Thus, with this election, he hoped that the voice of athletes will be represented at the highest levels of ANOCA and beyond.

The new ANOCA AC Chair?







amibian Gaby Ahrens,
Commonwealth Games
bronze medallist in shooting,
has become the first elected
Chair of the ANOCA Athletes'
Commission. Ahrens, who
finished third in ball-trap in Delhi in 2010,
was elected by more than 100 representatives
from all 54 African NOCs at the ANOCA
Athletes' Forum held in Algiers, which
unanimously supported the IOC's stance that
athletes from Russia and Belarus be given
the opportunity to return to international
competition well ahead of the Paris 2024
Olympic Games.

The newly elected Chair, who celebrated her 42nd birthday on the eve of the election, succeeds two-time 10,000m Olympic silver medallist, Kenya's Paul Tergat, who was appointed acting Chair of the ANOCA Athletes' Commission in 2021.

Gaby Diana Ahrens was born on 15 March 1981 in Windhoek, Namibia. She is a trap (shooting) specialist. Silver medallist in trap at the 2007 African Championships in Cairo, she competed in her first Olympic Games in 2008 in Beijing. She won the bronze medal in women's trap at the 2010 Commonwealth Games in Delhi and a gold medal at the 2011 African Championships in Rabat. She was the flag bearer for Namibia at the opening ceremony of the 2012 Summer Olympics in London. Gaby won her second continental trophy in trap at the 2015 African Championships in Cairo. She retired from competition sports after her third participation in the Olympic Games, which happened to be the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro.

The new ANOCA Athletes' Commission Chair is also Vice-Chair of NOC Namibia and member of the WADA Athletes' Commission.

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Return of Russian and Belarusian athletes

African athletes support ANOCA Executive Committee resolution

ver 100 African athletes' representatives attending the Continental Athletes' Forum held in Algiers unanimously expressed their full support for the resolution adopted by the ANOCA Executive Board on 3 March 2023, welcoming the return of Russian and Belarusian athletes competing as strictly neutral athletes in international competitions.

Representatives from 54 NOC Athletes' Commissions (ACs) from across Africa reasserted that athletes should never pay the price of any conflict, regardless of its nature or where it occurs. In their opinion, politics must not put pressure on sports to drift away from its fundamental values of solidarity and unity. The ANOCA Athletes' Forum has ruled that Russian and Belarusian athletes should be readmitted to international competitions with the status of neutral athletes. African athletes are of the opinion that these athletes should be allowed to participate in international competitions «without any form of discrimination.»





Statement by the ANOCA Athletes' Forum

he ANOCA AC support the IOC recommendations published on 28 March for the International Federations. During the recent ANOCA Athletes' Forum 11-12 March in Algiers, African athletes made a statement welcoming the return of Russian and Belarusian athletes competing as neutral athletes in international competitions.

It should be noted that some of our athlete representatives asked that the Russian and Belarusian athletes return to international competitions without any restrictions meaning participate under their national flag and anthem.

ANOCA AC would like to reiterate that athletes should never pay the price of a conflict their government is involved in.



World Olympians Association presents its activities in Algiers



he recent African Athletes' Forum was also an opportunity for the World Olympians Association (WOA) to address participants. The exchange took place in two phases. The first part introduced the organisation. It was noted that this institution is recognised by the International Olympic Committee with one hundred member associations across the world. In 2022, it carried out a wide range of projects for confirmed and budding athletes, as

well as in many camps hosting persons in distress. Its actions target areas like sports training, dissemination of Olympic values, environmental protection, etc.

The second part featured discussions between participants and WOA representatives, namely: Abeer Essawy, El Hadj Amadou Dia Ba and Sandrine Billiet. The session discussed career transition of athletes, status of the elite athlete, preparation for major competitions, etc.





Algiers Forum discusses first steps of the WADA Athlete Council

uring the African Athletes' Forum in Algiers, Gaby Ahrens gave a presentation on the way forward in terms of the involvement of athletes in the World Anti-Doping Agency under a new structure called the WADA Athlete Council. For sports to be a healthy activity, she believes that WADA's work should primarily be focused on athletes. The Council's vision is to create conditions for a world where all athletes can compete in a doping-free sports environment. She said that WADA's greatest potential for creating more opportunities to interact with athletes lies in online content and channels. The WADA Athlete Council was created in January 2023 as a WADA Permanent Special Committee.

It comprises 20 world-class athletes chosen by athletes, including herself. It is worth mentioning that the first meeting of this Council was scheduled for 16 March 2023. As concerns the Council's missions, they include: raising awareness and supporting clean sport; soliciting and sharing athletes' comments on the World Anti-Doping Programme; acting as ambassadors for WADA and clean sport; supporting WADA athletes engagement activities at major sports events; recommending effective ways to reach out to athletes and those close to them; broadening the reach of WADA by making commitments with their governments, sports disciplines and regional/national sports organisations.

The young association intends to deploy its first awareness-raising actions during major upcoming sports events, notably: the European Games, which will take place from 21 June to 2 July (Poland); the African Games, postponed from 8 to 24 March 2024 (Ghana); the Asian Games, from 23 September to 8 October 2023 (China) and the Pan-American Games, from 20 October to 5 November 2023 (Chile).





Olympic Solidarity... a powerful NOC assistance lever

key feature of the Algiers Forum was the presentation by Olympic Solidarity. This body is now the main organ of the Olympic Movement in supporting NOC projects. Today, a total of 206 NOCs benefit from diverse OS support, including the 54 in Africa. Citing Rule 5 of

the Olympic Charter, Olympic Solidarity's Olivier Niamkey said that its aim is to provide assistance to NOCs as part of athletes development programmes, especially the neediest. He explained how income from various Olympic Games is shared among the Organising Committee, NOCs, IOC and International Federations. Olympic Solidarity

The OS representative outlined the conditions for financial support laid down by his institution, namely: good governance,

transparency in funds management and compliance with financial guidelines. He also outlined the procedure for applications for support by NOCs even as he presented the numerous projects and programmes supported in Africa.
