Opening Ceremony Olympic Games Paris 2024

Africa and its athlete delegations light up the Seine





he River Seine, which flows through Paris, was chosen by the organisers as the venue for the official opening ceremony of the Olympic Games Paris 2024.

Athletes from across the world put up a show as they waved their flags and paraded down the river in boats. Though the weather

was unfriendly, with a heavy downpour that drenched the city of Paris, it in no way dampened the splendour of a ceremony that, for the first time in history, took place outside a stadium.

Officially opening the Games, French President Emmanuel MACRON declared:

"I declare open the Paris Olympic Games celebrating the 33rd Olympiad of the modern era"

This followed a speech delivered by Tony ESTANGUET, the Organising Committee Chair and three-time Olympic champion, who exclaimed:

"What a sight it is to see you all parading together! For the next fifteen days, you will be the best version of humanity. It is a huge honour to welcome you here 100 years after we last hosted the Summer Games."

And IOC President, Thomas BACH, who had these kind words:

"Finally, the moment is here: welcome to the Olympic Games Paris 2024! My heartfelt thanks to our gracious French hosts. Thank you for welcoming us in such a spectacular way. The Olympic flame will make Paris and all of France shine even brighter."

As for the ANOCA President, Mustapha BERRAF, he was full of praise for the African delegations:

"It was wonderful to see how African athletes communed with other nations at the opening ceremony. This solidarity is unprecedented and spectacular. Honestly, I think there's nothing more to say. This event is exceptional, exciting ...with such vivid demonstrations, bearing all the cultural, sporting, and especially, human hallmarks."

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African athletes, over 1000 in all, a 20% increase on last year's participation, made an impressive performance at this spectacular show.

Kenyans, Algerians, Ivorians, Cameroonians, Moroccans, Ethiopians, Somalis, Beninese, Gabonese, Djiboutians, Egyptians, Congolese from the DRC and Senegalese made an impressive show in front of 85 Heads of State and Government who braved the heavy rain, including 12 African Heads of State.

Drenched, dressed in their finest African regalia, the hyped-up athletes from Niger, Nigeria and Norway all joined in with dances and olas on the Diamant Bleu. A fleet of 116 boats sailed along a 6 km route in front of 300,000 spectators.

For African athletes, it was a thrilling experience. Cheick Cissé, 2016 Olympic Taekwendo champion, was overwhelmed:

"Today is the D-day. As athletes and young Ivorians, we're going to try and make the most of it. It's a very special moment which will be engraved not only in world sport, but also in my personal life. So, I'm very happy to be in Paris, a very beautiful city, the event is well organized."

Aristote Ndombe IMPELENGA, Congolese swimmer, could not contain his joy:

"This is my first time taking part in the Olympics. It is a dream come true. It is a coincidence that we are all here in Paris, so I'm very happy to take part in the Games. We all have the team spirit, and as it is commonly said in Congo, "Go leopards, we're all the same", and so we have the team spirit."



Thanks to its honourable political, sports and Olympic leaders, its stalwart champions and its rich cultural heritage, Africa left its indelible mark on the opening ceremony of the 33rd edition of the Olympic Games.

A 4-hour parade that thrilled spectators and television audiences worldwide. Rain, diversity, stars and monuments, the opening ceremony of the Paris 2024 Olympic Games embodied the Olympic values. Africa was also in the spotlight. Aya Nakamura, the most streamed French-speaking artist in the world, a French-Malian singer, delivered a standout performance alongside stars such as Lady Gaga and Céline Dion who made her highly anticipated musical return with a performance that closed out the Paris 2024 Olympics opener.

A spectacular ceremony, graced by African delegations




declare open the Paris Olympic Games celebrating the 33rd Olympiad of the modern era." It was with these words that French President Emmanuel MACRON, at the request of IOC President, Thomas BACH, closed the opening ceremony of the Olympic Games Paris 2024. An exceptional, spectacular, prestigious and colourful opening ceremony, graced by the participation of African delegations. A parade of over 3 hours with 85 boats on the River Seine and delegations of the 206 nations on board.

Paris was treated to an unforgettable ceremony thanks to the presence of 80 Heads of State and Government, including 12 African Heads of State to participate in the opening ceremony. At the invitation of the IOC President and the French President, the Presidents of Cameroon, Senegal, Rwanda, Djibouti, the Central African Republic and Gabon, among others, attended the opening ceremony of the Olympic Games Paris 2024 on 26 July. They were joined by ANOCA President Mustapha BERRAF, and Presidents of all 54 African NOCs.

As each African delegation paraded by, they were greeted with cheers, shouts of joy and loud applause. From the delegations of athletes from Algeria, Mali, Senegal, Ethiopia and Kenya, to those from Zimbabwe, Uganda, Rwanda, Congo and the DRC, not forgetting the delegations from Cameroon, Morocco, South Africa and Egypt, African culture, in all its diversity, originality and specificity, was celebrated and hailed on the banks of the Seine, through the shimmering outfits in the colours of each national flag, as each boat passed.

The delegation of Egyptian athletes, wearing white outfits topped with kefie in the colours of the national flag, and by far the largest on

















the continent, received a standing ovation, as did Morocco and South Africa. An impressive procession of delegations, interrupted from time to time by choreographed sequences, fashion parades, musical comedies and dances performed by rapper-artists, while the mysterious athlete carrying the Olympic flame crossed the Seine at very high altitude, gliding on a rope linking two rooftops on either side of the river.

Zimbabwe with a small delegation, which was the last African delegation to take part in the parade, received a standing ovation for the original outfits worn by their

athletes, to close the parade along the River Seine. IOC President Thomas BACH then set the stage for the ceremony when he triumphantly declared: "finally, the moment is here: welcome to the Olympic Games Paris 2024... uniting all 206 NOCs and the Olympic Refugee Team, let us celebrate the joy of sport with the whole world."

President Emmanuel MACRON grasped the opportunity offered by Thomas BACH to declare the solemn opening of Paris 2024, the 33rd Olympiad of the modern era. Then came the Olympic oath dubbed: "for a sport without doping, without cheating and without





any form of discrimination", a commitment to respect and ensure equality among athletes, was the oath taken by Mélina ROBERT-MICHON and Florent MANAUDOU, as well as two judges and two coaches.

The highlight of the ceremony was the Olympic flame taking centre stage for the ultimate lap and the finishing stretch, with relays between Zidane, Nadal, Tony PARKER, Karl LEWIS and Serena WILLIAMS, with Teddy RINER and Marie-José PEREC as the final flame bearers, who were tasked with lighting the Olympic

cauldron. To get the Paris 2024 Olympics festivities started with the participation of African athletes, ANOCA President Mustapha BERRAF estimated athletes medal chances at 50%.

Proud of the participation of African athletes, President BERRAF, talking on TV5 Monde Afrique after the Games' opening ceremony said: "I can tell you that our athletes, a little over 1,000, will represent Africa, although there are many African athletes in European and American teams that we are also proud of; we are proud of their origins."

By relocating the opening ceremony to the Seine on Friday evening, Thomas JOLLY, Artistic Director of Paris 2024, wanted to break with tradition and offer something that has never been seen before. And the gamble paid off. Despite the rain, which slightly marred the magic of various scenes, several moments will undoubtedly remain engraved in people's minds, and above all in the annals of this 33rd Olympiad.



Dear athletes, this is the pinnacle of your Olympic journey. You came to Paris as athletes. Now you are Olympians.


Stepping into the Olympic Village, it dawns on you like generations of Olympians before:

TV5 Monde: You are welcome to Journal Afrique's TV studio! You are the ANOCA President and you attended the OG opening ceremony. Perhaps the first question should be: What are your thoughts? What are your first impressions?

Mustapha BERRAF: Indeed, I am privileged to have been elected president by my peers. Honestly, I think there's nothing more to say. The event is exceptional, exciting. The theme for the opening ceremony (...) is a high-level one, with great probity. I think it's the first time we are participating in an opening ceremony with such vivid demonstrations, bearing all the cultural, sporting, and especially, human hallmarks.

Journalist: I said a while ago that there are more than 1,000 African athletes at the Games. In your opinion, which are the countries and, perhaps, disciplines that we must look out for?

Mustapha BERRAF: You know we are elated to have more than 1,000 athletes, as you said, that qualified for the OG because qualification in itself is a challenge that these athletes rose to and the number of qualified athletes has increased by approximately 20% compared with previous editions, and I also think that this should be credited to the NOCs and the perfect harmony they have with their governments. Athletes are motivated and determined, they have worked hard, and have had huge resources put at their disposal by their governments, the IOC's Olympic Solidarity, which has provided tremendous



support, as well as the mechanisms we put in place that helped to supply, equip and train all these talented young athletes, notably those ranked amongst the top 10 in the world rankings.

Journalist: In 2021 Mr BERRAF, at the last Olympiads in Tokyo, Africa won 37 medals. Do you think this year we can have more than that?

Mustapha BERRAF: Africa bagged 37 medals, 11 of them in gold. We are currently looking forward to more than a 20% increase. We have set our sights on about 50 medals at Paris 2024. As you know, Africans are also moved by their love for Paris, they are used to Paris, many of them are used to Paris and, by the way, they are currently fully integrated into some cities in France. There is also that

spiritual aspect that has made some cities in France welcome African athletes with much love and emotion like Kenyans who are currently in one of the cities of France and are very much integrated.

Journalist: On the organisation of major sports events, although Africa has never organised any Olympic Games, Senegal is gearing up for the 2026 Youth Olympic Games. Resource-wise, how do you live up to the challenge of organising such a sports gathering like the OG?

Mustapha BERRAF: I can confidently tell you that we are very happy that, for the first time, Africa will be organising the Olympic Games, even if they are the Youth Olympic Games that are a smaller version of the Senior Olympics, which as you know, are





a global event. I think Senegal is working relentlessly to ensure that people receive a warm welcome, that sport is spotlighted, and that the YOG in Senegal is sufficient proof that Africa has the infrastructural, human, and material potential to host the Olympic Games.

Journalist: Exactly. Speaking of potential, which African countries in your opinion have the potential to host the Olympic Games in future?

Mustapha BERRAF: As you know, South Africa has already organised the World Cup and North Africa through Morocco will be co-hosting the next World Cup with Spain. North African countries have all the potentials required and some West African countries also have huge potentials. You can see that Senegal has invested heavily

in infrastructure. I honestly think that things cannot be rushed and we can imagine that in the long run there will be candidates making their case. We currently have Egypt bidding for 2036 and 2040, and I believe Africa in its entirety will support this bid to ensure that the International Olympic City that they created and the new Cairo Olympic City welcome the Olympic Games. Quite frankly, however, I can tell you that our athletes, a little over 1,000, will represent Africa, although there are many African athletes in European and American teams that we are also proud of; we are proud of their origins.

Olympic Village welcomes African athletes

lympic rings are usually the first attraction for all athletes across the world, and African athletes made no exception to the rule as they took pictures with the rings.

It was a crucial moment to get in shape prior to the start of various events. Chefs de mission of each African delegation welcomed athletes at the entrance to the Olympic Village, where the latter took up official residence and some of them proudly hoisted their national flags on their balconies.

This was the case for athletes from South Africa, Senegal, Cameroon, Algeria, Ethiopia, Kenya and Morocco, among others. They are among the 9,000 athletes who are staying in the Olympic Village located north of Paris, in Seine-Saint-Denis to be precise, on a 52-hectare complex that can host 14,500 athletes.

African athletes have been enjoying the comfort, tranquillity and safety of this venue, where they can prepare mentally and physically before the pressure of various





competitions mounts. All 54 African NOCs are well represented by their athletes.

Some African delegations organised coordination meetings to provide the best possible accommodation, transport and training conditions before the start of the Games.

Several African officials also visited the Olympic Village before the arrival of athletes to ensure excellent reception and accommodation conditions.

For instance, the new President of the Republic of Senegal, His Excellency Bassirou Diomaye Faye, visited the Olympic Village in company with the Minister of Sports and members of NOC Senegal (CNOSS) to meet Senegalese athletes. During this visit, he stated: "I can guarantee you that with this new government, we will pay attention to all competing athletes, because all sports are equal. Just remember one thing: all of

Senegal is very proud of you. You may not hear my cheers of encouragement, but like every other Senegalese, I will be your fervent supporter."

The President of the Republic of Gabon, General Brice Clotaire Oligui Ngema, also visited the Olympic Village to galvanise Team Gabon. To the 5 athletes representing his country, he said: "Push your limits and give Gabon medals, whatever the colour! You are our ambassadors. Since 30 June, our country has achieved a number of successes in various fields, and we expect the same success from you here. The most important thing for us is the medals. I know there aren't many of you, but the Republic is counting on you."

The Minister for Youth and Sports and President of NOC Algeria, Abdelrahmane Hamad, also visited the Olympic Village to check out all the reception arrangements.





Also, the fact that all African delegations received a warm welcome from the communities living in Paris, volunteers and workers of different nationalities, including French nationals was a cause for satisfaction.








































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
